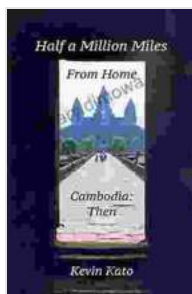


# Half a Million Miles from Home: Cambodia Then

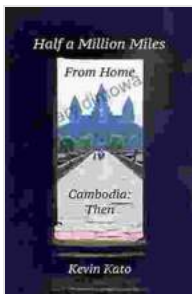
